A FRESH START

During what was a difficult 2007, facing many challenges and stretching finances to within an inch of breaking-point, we were also aware that we were approaching a time for real celebration: the achievement of 60 years of maintaining and sailing Thames Barges.

We therefore supplemented our General Committee meetings last year with a few 'Think Tank' sessions, in order to identify our strengths and weaknesses and what we'd like to change and achieve over the coming years.

This resulted in an agreement during our first meeting this year to a reorganisation of our operational structure, with an emphasis on better communication and a sharing of responsibilities and workloads between a greater number of people.

To do this we have created management teams: Finance/Admin, Sailing, Barges, Membership, Heritage and Events/Publicity. The plan is for these groups to meet, with any Officer or interested member/volunteer attending whichever meeting/s they wish. Each team will report back to the General Committee on plans and actions, seeking ratification for any big decisions.

We've already generated plenty of ideas which we are putting into action, e.g. contacting new members personally to welcome them and talk about the Trust's work. We'll be looking at publicity, the website, volunteer co-ordination and fundraising amongst many other things.

What we really wish to encourage is

the participation anyone who would like to help in moving the Trust forward, giving what time and skills they can with no obligation to become an Officer of the Trust or attend General Committee meetings.

Members' interest, financial support and sailing participation are all important and appreciated, but we really need more direct involvement by more people to stand any chance of surviving for another 60 years...

We will be moving to monthly General Committee meetings while we feel our way with the new structure. Mr. Frank R. Turner. An Illustrated Talk: "The Maunsell Sea Forts"

Built out at sea during the early days of the second world war. These groups of towers are often seen in the distance when sailing in the Thames Estuary or off the east coast. They were built for anti-aircraft defence and to look out for anti-shiping mines dropped in an attempt to shut off the port of London. More recently, they came to wide public attention when pirate radio stations set up on some of them. Maunsell was the engineer that designed these towers which are now regarded as forerunners of the North Sea oil rigs A preservation trust has been set up to restore one.
